- During the month of August, Sedgwick County Developmental Disability Organization (SCDDO) Quality Assurance Staff completed 5 day and 23 residential program visits.
- The SCDDO Management Team and system stakeholders participated in a Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) mapping event. SIM is an applied strategic planning tool to improve cross-system collaborations to reduce involvement in the justice system by people with mental and substance use disorders. SCDDO's mapping event is the first to include people with intellectual/developmental disabilities, as well as other populations with disabilities. The event drew participation from stakeholders from across the community as well as participation by members of the KDADS administration. The DRAFT report is expected sometime in September and will be instrumental as the department enters into strategic planning for 2022-2025.
- SCDDO Director participated in a Project ECHO Immersion Training with representatives from Heartspring and
 InterHab to explore the potential for the model to be used to continue to address the gap in services for
 individuals with IDD and a co-occurring behavioral health condition. Project ECHO is an evidence based
 approach to the democratization of knowledge through expert didactics and professional peer case
 consultation. The potential for local Project ECHO replication of existing MH/DD programs is under thoughtful
 consideration and will potentially be included in strategic plans moving forward.
- An exciting step toward professionalizing the role of the Direct Support Professional in Kansas was made in August. After many months of hard work and diligent collaboration the first two badge courses in the planned series of stackable digital credentials leading to 3 DSP certifications were opened for enrollment! DSP Basic Part One and DSP Basic Part Two are now available and offer the first steps in the certification pathway. These courses also are open to high school seniors in USD259 (Wichita) and juniors/seniors in USD261 (Haysville) as part of the next steps in building the bridge from high school to the DSP workforce. SCDDO Director completed

two presentations to the KDADS/MCO standing LTSS Advisory Committee on the project and to InterHab membership during the month of August. - During August, community service stakeholder agencies were brought together to meet with Melody Head from Wichita Workforce Alliance to explore the potential to develop a Registered Apprenticeship Program for Direct Support Professionals using the DSP Badge Program through WSU as the Related Technical Instruction as the foundation to the proposed apprenticeship. SCDDO will continue to coordinate the exploration of the program.
- A small residential agency closed at the end of August. Due to the short notice, the SCDDO worked hard to
 coordinate with the residents and their guardians to ensure no one experienced a gap in services. While
 Sedgwick County crisis providers were provided notice that they might be needed, all persons served were able
 to select a new residential provider and get moved by the deadline.
