The Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee (JJOC) has promoted an "Innovations in Community Supervision Grant" which presents an opportunity for community stakeholders and the SCDOC to collaborate for better services for youth and families in Sedgwick County. As of this writing, a process for accessing these funds has not been publicized. A collaborative exists with sufficient interest to launch such a program in Sedgwick County when a funding mechanism is released.

Team Justice has identified that a day treatment center/drop-in center with resource/service model, services addressing homelessness/transitional age youth and mental health/substance treatment are among the highest community priorities for future funding considerations. However, addressing these needs/services will require a larger, collaborative effort between multiple agencies and likely falls outside of the capabilities of the funding made available by the Kansas Department of Corrections/evidence based funding grant.
