## 2021 NOTABLE ACCOMPLISHMENTS



Vaccines for the Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic rolled out in early 2021. The Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) authorized the use of a portion of its \$99.6 million in Federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES) funding to be to provide staffing and leased space for both COVID-19 mass testing and vaccination sites to respond to the pandemic.



After extreme weather in February 2021 that caused unprecedented spikes in utility costs, the BOCC acted quickly to declare a local disaster emergency to assist smaller cities who operated utilities to access emergency funding.



In December 2021, the BOCC approved a redistricting plan after assembling a community-wide task force to review options and make recommendations. The BOCC approved the plan that was recommended unanimously by the task force.



The BOCC passed the 2022 Sedgwick County budget with a flat mill levy rate. The budget prioritized equity in regards to compensation, funding safety services, and continuing community partnerships.

### SEDGWICK COUNTY

Located in south-central Kansas, Sedgwick County was officially established in 1867 and bears the name of Civil War hero Major General John Sedgwick of the Union Army. In 1870, Sedgwick County's first county officials were elected and the City of Wichita was selected to be the county seat.

Sedgwick County occupies 1,008 square miles of land is the second most populous of the 105 counties in Kansas, with an estimated 513, 607 residents. Wichita, the largest city in the state of Kansas, is known as the "Air Capital of World" for its internationally-recognized concentration of commercial and military airplane production and aviation services.

The County is governed by a five-member Board of Sedgwick County Commissioners that meets in regular session each Wednesday morning except for the last Wednesday of each month. The commissioners, who serve four-year terms, are full-time County officials and perform executive, legislative, and policy-related functions.

The Commissioners also appoint a professional County Manager to administer most county functions, and to implement policy decisions. Tasks of the County Manager range from the management of special projects to the daily functions of approximately 2,580 full-time employees.

### ECONOMIC INDICATORS

The Wichita MSA unemployment rate at the end of 2021 was 3.2%, this was a 1.1% decrease from 2020.

At the end of the first quarter of 2021, the median home sales price in Wichita for new and existing homes was \$182,800.

In Sedgwick County, residential property accounts for the largest percentage (62.5 percent) of the total assessd value of real property. The second largest is commercial property, comprising of 34.4 percent of the county's total assessed value of real property.



Health care jobs remain the highest paying occupations in Kansas.

The cost of living in Wichita is a moderate 92.2, almost 7.8% below the national urban area average.



Charges for Services revenues increased \$2.3 million in 2021 compared to 2020 as Sedgwick County was able to offer more services safely in 2021 as restrictions were lifted.

Charges for services are fees charged to users of a service to offset the incurred cost.

Operating grants and contributions decreased \$28.5 million from 2020 to 2021. This decrease is primarily due to the COVID funding that the County received in 2020 in compared to what was received in 2021.

Operating grants and contributions are grant funds that are to be used specifically for the day to day costs of running the program.

Capital grants and contributions increased \$.026 million.

Capital grants and contributions are grant funds that are to be used specifically for the purchase of property, the construction, remodeling or expansions of the facility, or to purchase equipment needed to run the program.

Property tax collections increased \$8.6 million; The County's assessed valuation grew 4.6% for the 2021 budget year.




Government wide expenses increased \$11.4 million.



# TOTAL NET POSITION \$544 Million

At the end of 2021, the total net position (assets minus liabilities) of Sedgwick County was \$544 million. The largest portion of the County's net position, \$478.4 million (90 percent), is invested in capital assets (e.g. land, buildings, infrastructure, machinery and equipment) less depreciation and any related outstanding debt used to acquire those assets. Sedgwick County uses these capital assets to provide services to citizens; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending.




### RESTRICTED NET POSITION

Restricted net position of \$62.0 million (11.4 percent of net position) are resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used.


Unrestricted net position at the end of 2020 totaled \$10.5 million. GASB Statement No. 68 requires the County to record its proportionate share of the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS) collective net pension liability.



## What the Average Homeowner Pays

Sedgwick County provides a wide range of services to citizens. The checkbook to the left shows the functions of County government and how property tax is used to fund operations. The checkbook uses property tax on a home with an assessed value of \$100,000 and shows how the property tax is used on a monthly basis.

IN 2021 YEARLY: \$337.82 MONTHLY: \$28.15

The total amount of property tax paid to the County Fire District, by the owners of a single-family home with an average market value of \$100,000 is \$205.75 per year or \$17.15 per month.

### Only a small portion of your property taxes goes to support Sedgwick County's operations.

The chart below shows for every \$1.00 of your property taxes paid for a person living in the City of Wichita, Sedgwick County received approximately 25 cents.

### FISCAL CHALLENGES GOING FORWARD

#### Employee compensation, recruitment, and retention

Many areas within the County organization have experienced higher turnover than usual in the last year, particularly as the labor market has gained significant momentum, driving up competition for qualified workforce.

When staff positions are not filled or have delays in being filled, this presents challenges to many areas of organization, particularly those with 24/7 operations where coverage is critical. Within the context of recent economic challenges, including very high inflation, the County is focused on addressing compensation concerns to improve the County's ability to recruit and retain a highlyqualified workforce.

#### **Economic uncertainty**

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the novel coronavirus, COVID-19, a pandemic. The effects of COVID-19 were wide ranging and impactful across our community, the state, the nation, and the world Due to the infusion of Federal funding into the national economy to try to mitigate the effects, COVID-19-related supply chain disruptions, and other world events, inflation has soared to near-historic levels. Home values increased significantly due to a very tight market; vehicles and computers are increasingly challenging to purchase; construction costs have soared. As the Federal Reserve attempts to control inflation and address these other challenges, concerns are rising related to a possible recession.

#### Behavioral health and substance use challenges

In recent years, Sedgwick County Commissioners and community partners identified a rapidly growing need for behavioral health services in our community, due in part to substance use issues.

This need was exacerbated by the effects of

COVID-19. The impact is felt across the County organization, particularly the

> criminal justice and mental health areas. The Sedgwick County Sheriff has chaired the Mental Health & Substance Use Coalition, which is a team of stakeholders that was assembled to develop relationships and identify solutions through partnerships, to include the County, other governments, hospital systems,

While it will take a cultural change that could span a generation to truly address these issues, Commissioners continue to evaluate options to expand and improve access to services.

advocacy groups, and others.

#### Planning for growth

The need for more space has been a consistent theme from public safety agencies in the last several budget cycles. With the County's ARPA award, funds have been allocated to move County administrative functions out of the County Courthouse and into leased space to accommodate the remodel of the Courthouse into full District Attorney, District Court, and Sheriff space. Commissioners will be evaluating long-term solutions for County administrative space throughout 2022.

**B492:** Bridge replacement on 103rd St S between 103rd and 119th St W – tandem project with B501 to replace structurally deficient bridges on a main commuter and trucking route.

B497: Bridge replacement on Ridge Rd between MacArthur Rd and 47th St S – replaced a structurally deficient bridge with load restrictions on a main artery into south Wichita

R175: Performed preventive maintenance on 210.3 lane miles, or 17.2%, of the paved road system.

Sedgwick County Zoo - Opening in 1971, Sedgwick County Zoo has been ranked among the best zoos in the United States. Home to more than 2,000 individual animals of nearly 400 different species, the Zoo is the #1 outdoor family attraction in Kansas.

Wichita River Festival - Sedgwick County is a longtime supporter and participant in this week-long festival of events, music, art, food and community development to welcome summer.

Wichita/Sedgwick County Historical Museum- A wide variety of the Museum's exhibits showcase life in Wichita over the centuries.
