i. Nick Flanders from WAMPO shared about three community surveys.




WHAT IS WAMPO?

- 50,000 population = Federally created Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO)
 - Provides local elected officials input into the planning and implementation of federal transportation funds
- 200,000 population = Transportation Management Area (TMA)
 - Direct funding from FHWA to select projects in the WAMPO area
 - About \$10-\$15 million per year
- Long-Range and Short-Range Planning




• The Electric Vehicle Plan supports the Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 and the Charge Up Kansas NEVI Plan, by advancing the use of EVs to improve air quality and fostering economic development. WAMPO has an opportunity to adapt to emerging technologies by closing EV charging infrastructure gaps and removing barriers to EV adoption.




WHAT IS EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT?

FEMA: The managerial function charged with creating the framework within which communities reduce vulnerability to hazards and cope with disasters

<u>Sedgwick County Emergency</u> <u>Management Mission</u>

Build, sustain, and improve Sedgwick County's capabilities in disaster prevention, preparedness, mitigation, response, and recovery through whole community collaboration, innovative planning, training, and exercise activities



KANSAS STATUTES

- K.S.A. 48-929(a) Establishes Emergency Management as a County function and charges each EM Agency with coverage and protection of all cities within their county
- 48-929(b) Allows for cities to petition Governor for establishing their own EMA – own staff, own responsibility, own plans
 - No cities in Kansas have petitioned
 - KCK and Wyandotte Co are a combined interjurisdictional agency (48-930)


EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER

- ▶ Three Levels of activation
 - ► Monitoring (level3)
 - Partial (level2)
 - ► Full (level 1)
- Situational Monitoring
- Operational Coordination
- Resource Support
- Keeping Local & State Government Informed
- Supporting local responders

- Outdoor Warning Devices (153)

TRAINING & EXERCISES

Plans need to be trained on and practiced

- All-hazards, not just weather
 - ▶ HAZMAT Release
 - Transportation Accidents
 - Cybersecurity attacks
 - Civil Unrest
 - Active Shooter
 - Mass Casualty Incidents
- > Identify gaps and shortfalls before a disaster
- Build relationships







GET INVOLVED: LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE (LEPC)

- Committee of volunteers from different groups and organizations described in Section 301c Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act (EPCRA)
- Link between local government and industries to enhance HAZMAT preparedness
- All-Hazards planning: identify hazards that pose a risk to the community and evaluate available resources
- Meets Quarterly/Open to the public
 - Locations rotate throughout county and virtual (ZOOM link)
 - 3rd Thursday, 2nd month of quarter, 2PM





GET INVOLVED: (CERT) COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

- > Trained neighbors helping neighbors
 - Light search and rescue
 - Fire safety
 - Basic first aid
 - Shared resources
- Allows professional responders to focus on complex tasks
- Basic training level and advanced training options
- Assist in large events
 - Riverfest, NCAA tournament, county fair, parades, health fairs, other special events)





MAKE A PLAN

- Plan for disruptions in services regardless of cause
 - Utility Failure (electricity, gas, water)
 - Communication failure
 - Delayed emergency response
 - Food, water, fuel shortages
- ► How will I receive emergency alerts/warnings?
- ▶ Where is my safe shelter/evacuation route?
 - ► <u>HAZMAT Shelter in Place is different than severe weather sheltering</u>
- ▶ Do I know how to shut off utilities at my home?
- ► How do I communicate with my family/household?
 - Cell phones may not work or may be damaged/lost
 - Do you have any phone numbers memorized? Write them down and include in disaster k
- What supplies will my household (and pets) need during the first 72 hours? Medications? Special dietary needs?





BOTTOM LINE

Emergency Management is here to help communities, businesses and individuals prepare for, mitigate against, respond to, and recover from the impacts of *all-hazard* events

b. Questions

- i. Does Emergency Management partner with Red Cross?
 - 1. Yes, Red Cross has a desk in Emergency Management center.
 - 2. Working to partner with CERT team as well
- ii. How will people know about an emergency if they speak different languages?
 - 1. Vulnerability that the department is working on
 - 2. Meeting with International Relief Committee to address
 - 3. Have partners that work in Vietnamese and Spanish
 - 4. Working on bringing Spanish-specific Listos program to County
 - 5. Working with partners, but open to more ideas or connections
- iii. EOC building
 - 1. Current Emergency Operations Center is underneath 911 **Emergency Communications Center**
 - 2. Looking to build new center due to growth and lessons learned from COVID-19
 - 3. Applied for grant to fund building the center
 - 4. Already purchased land near Murdock and Meridian
 - 5. Expect to hear about grant on August 4th
- iv. Tornado sirens in Derby
 - 1. In the midst of capital improvement project to upgrade and enhance outdoor warning system; new technology mixed with old technology
 - 2. Signal went twice automatically and once manually, but was not received in the polygon zone in Derby
 - 3. Electrical components that are a part of the old technology failed
 - 4. Important for people to use multiple means of receiving emergency information
 - 5. Mechanical test of sirens occurs weekly on Mondays if weather
- v. Olivia Hayse suggested seeking grant funding for emergency communications to help connect with the public more effectively

c. Chief John Turner, Derby Fire Department; Batallion Chief Lane Pearlman, Wichita Fire Department; Deputy Chief Ray Hensley, Sedgwick County Fire District 1; and Captain Nick Becker, Sedgwick County Fire District 1 shared information about HAZMAT and train concerns

 - 1. Aware of risks, specialize in handling these issues
- ii. Recruiting and staffing
 - 1. Starting to recruit at high schools, lot of interest
- e. Julie Stimson shared that emergency management is happy to speak to any group about disaster preparedness

 - 1. Veterans Administration working with the City
 - 2. County not leading the program but there to support
