## Dr. Shelly Steadman

Performance Metrics and Trends

- Medical Investigations
  - o 1,398 reported deaths Jan 1-April 30, 2024
  - o 313 death scenes Jan 1-April 30, 2024 about 1 fewer scenes per week
  - For 2023 cases, 12 are still pending Toxicology results. Of those 12, about 6 were still in testing.
- Pathology
  - Approximately 12% of work is out-of-county for 2024 cases
  - Suicides have trended downward
  - In 2023, overdose cases accounted for ~23% of the caseload
    - 63% of overdose cases are related to fentanyl
- Toxicology
  - o Backlog
    - Toxicology backlog is at 109 at end of April
    - The 2 new LCMS instruments are much more sensitive to the environment, the air quality control isn't ideal in the current building
  - o Number of toxicology cases has not increased
  - HPT/DUI backlog cases are slightly higher due to instrumentation repairs and the 2 scientists in Fire Debris training
    - Number of submissions has remained stable
- Drug Identification
  - Backlog is directly related to staffing challenges and training
  - Number of cases submitted has decreased (WPD is using state lab as a secondary resource)
  - o Drug ID fentanyl positive exhibits are up 684% from 2021
- Fire Debris
  - Currently not taking cases due to staff in training, one scientist from Toxicology and one from Drug ID
- Firearms
  - Firearms Examiner is now fully trained and accepting all types of firearms analysis
    - JOCO and KBI completing technical reviews and verifications
  - Firearms backlog (8) is a function of waiting for reviews to be completed
  - o 55 firearms cases submitted Jan 1-April 30, 2024
- Biology/DNA
  - Biology/DNA backlog has decreased significantly
  - Turnaround time on rape kits is now approximately 4 months
  - Working on validation projects
  - Biology/DNA case submissions have remained stable 114 received between Jan 1-April 30, 2024

Quarterly Summary

- Both LC-MS/MS instrument validations underway and continuing to outsource with various grants in Tox
- Land acquisition for DNA addition is on hold -- space study is underway

- RFSC has one vacancy (Reception/Front Desk position), pathology staffing is stable and case volume is no longer increasing
- Dr. Schainost appointed to the Kansas State Child Death Review Board
- Several staff members recently attended the State Coroner Conference

**OD2A Grant** 

- Robert Hansen and Shelly attended the CDC Conference in Atlanta, required for OD2A: Local grant award participation
- RFSC is required to test 500 items from death scenes (items that will not be used in a criminal investigation)
- Medical Investigations have collected drugs and/or paraphernalia at 40 scenes since starting the project December 2023
- Criminalistics Supervisor is overseeing the training of our new chemist in Drug ID, the purchase of a new GC-MS, and the validation of the GC-MS
- Criminalistics Supervisor has tested 128 items
  - Of the 128 items, 29 items tested positive for fentanyl
- Results are posted on the RFSC website and shared with our partners at the Health Department
- Our progress in collection and testing is advanced compared to others encountered at the CDC conference

2023 Grants Submitted

- Coverdell Formula (\$99,900) award pending
- Coverdell Formula solicitation negotiation underway
- CEBR (\$302,018) BOCC approval pending
- JAG (\$42,824) awarded and spending underway
- KDHE OD2A (\$60,000) program underway
- OD2A Local (\$250,000) program underway

Anticipated 2024 Grants

• OD2A Local (\$250,000) - Year 2 budget in progress

2025 Budget

- No decision package presented this year
- Need to start considering funding for LIMS will fund with Coverdell one more year

CIP Requests

• DNA Addition - land acquisition vs. other options

Questions and Discussion

- Mr. Breitenbach asked if there was a prohibition on using the tested items for a criminal investigation in the future? For example, to charge a separate individual with distribution.
- Dr. Steadman responded that the program should not interfere with prosecuting

those cases and that SOPs were established for documenting items collected through the Investigator's submission to a depository. Thereafter, digital chain of custody is initiated and all standard laboratory procedures are in place as would be for any criminal matter.
