

Ron Paschal is a Deputy District Attorney who supervises the Juvenile Division of the Office of the District Attorney. As the supervisor of the division, Mr. Paschal oversees the Offender/Child In Need of Care (CINC) programs in the office at 1900 E. Morris in Wichita. He also serves as Ethics Coordinator of the Office of the District Attorney. Mr. Paschal has been with the District Attorney's Office since 1997.

Mr. Paschal completed his undergraduate degree in Administration of Justice from Wichita State University and his Juris Doctor degree from Washburn University School of Law. He has served on the Supreme Court Task Force on Permanency Planning since his appointment to the task force in 2004 by Chief Justice McFarland. He is a member of the National District Attorney Association, the Kansas County and District Attorneys Association (KCDAA), the Wichita Bar Association, and is also a long standing member of the Wichita Bar Association Grievance and Ethics Committee and the statewide Prosecutor's Grievance and Ethics Committee for the Kansas Disciplinary Administrator, the Kansas Supreme Court Task Force on Permanency Planning, and Sedgwick County Advisory Board on Juvenile Justice. Ron was recently appointed Co-Chair of the Criminal Justice Section Ethics, Gideon & Professionalism Committee. This Committee of the American Bar Association is a nationwide committee that reviews the relevant rules of professional conduct and makes recommendations for policy changes in addition to providing practical education. He is Chairman of the statewide prosecutors grievance committee with the responsibility of investigating attorney misconduct complaints. Mr. Paschal is the Chairman of Team Justice, the Juvenile Corrections Advisory Board to the Sedgwick County Commission. Team Justice advises county management on best practices for handling juvenile prevention and intervention matters in the Eighteenth Judicial District in Wichita.
